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GDPR Privacy Notice

Who processes your information?

Under data protection law, individuals have a right to be informed about how the school uses any personal data that we hold about them. We comply with this right by providing ‘privacy notices’ to individuals where we are processing their personal data, and by having a Data Protection Policy.

This privacy notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data about our **pupils**. We, Boothferry Primary School, Newport Street, Goole are the data controller for the purposes of data protection law. Our school has an appointed Data Protection Officer, whose role is to oversee and monitor the school’s data protection procedures, and to ensure that the school is compliant with data protection laws (Data Protection Act 2018 and the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR)).

Categories of pupil information that we process include:

- Personal identifiers – (names, pupil numbers and addresses, date of birth, identification documents)
- Characteristics – (ethnicity, language, nationality, country of birth, and free school meal eligibility)
- Safeguarding information (such as court orders and professional involvement)
- Special Educational Needs (including the needs and ranking)
- Pupil and curricular records
- Attendance information (such as session attended, number of absences, absence reasons and any previous schools attended)
- Assessment and Attainment information – e.g. national curriculum assessment results
- Medical and Administration (such as doctors’ information, child health, dental health, allergies, medication and dietary requirements)
- Episodes of being a child in need (such as referral information, assessment information, Section 47 information, Initial Child Protection information and Child Protection Plan information)
- Episodes of being Looked After (such as important dates, information on placements)
- Outcomes for Looked after Children (such as whether health and dental assessments are up to date, strengths and difficulties questionnaire scores and offending)
- Adoptions (such as dates of key court orders and decisions)
- Care leavers (such as their activity and what type of accommodation they have)
- Behavioural information – e.g. exclusion information and any relevant alternative provision put in place



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- Financial Data (such as bank account or credit card details, eligibility for free school meals or other financial assistance)
- Grant information (such as eligibility for pupil premium service)
- Details of any support received, including care packages, plans and support providers
- Visual Imagery (such as video and photography images used by the school to promote the school and any school activities e.g. school sports day)
- CCTV imagery (to be used in order to provide security for the school site, keep people safe, evidence in investigations)

This list is not exhaustive, a detailed list of categories of information we process is recorded on the schools Information Asset Register.

Why do we collect and use pupil information?

The personal data collected is essential, for the school to fulfil their official functions and meet legal requirements.

We collect and use pupil information, for the following purposes:

- To support pupil learning
- Support Children in Need and Looked After Children and monitor their progress
- To monitor and report on pupil attainment progress
- To provide appropriate pastoral care
- To assess the quality of our service
- To keep children safe (food allergies, or emergency contact details)
- To meet the statutory duties placed upon us by the Department for Education
- Evaluate and improve our policies

We may also receive information from their previous school, local authority and the Department for Education (DFE).

Under data protection laws, the main lawful bases we rely on for processing pupil information are:

- The data subject has given consent to the processing of his or her personal data for one or more specific purposes;
- Processing is necessary for compliance with a legal obligation to which the controller is subject; and
- Processing is necessary for the performance of a task carried out in the public interest or in the exercise of official authority vested in the controller.

In addition, the legal basis for processing any special categories information is:



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- Processing is necessary for reasons of substantial public interest,
- The data subject has given explicit consent to the processing of those personal data for one or more specified purposes.

Collecting this information

We collect pupil information throughout a pupil's time at school, but in particular from the pupil registration from when they start at the school. We may also obtain information from third parties such as their previous school, by Common Transfer File.

Pupil data is essential for the schools' operational use. Whilst the majority of pupil information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it is requested on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with data protection laws, we will inform you at the point of collection, whether you are required to provide certain pupil information to us or if you have a choice in this and we will tell you what you need to do if you do not want to share this information with us.

Storing pupil data

We hold pupil data securely for the set amount of time shown in our data retention schedule. Who do we share pupil information with?

We do not share information about pupils with any third party without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

Where it is legally required, or necessary (and it complies with data protection law) we may share personal information about pupils with:

- Schools
- Our local authority – to meet our legal obligations to share certain information with it, such as safeguarding concerns and exclusions
- The Department for Education
- The pupil's family and representatives
- Educators and examining boards
- Our regulator (Ofsted)
- Suppliers and service providers – so that they can provide the services we have contracted them for eg school meals



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- Financial organisations – e.g. School Money
- Central and Local government
- Our auditors
- Survey and research organisations
- Health authorities and social welfare organisations – e.g. School Nurse, Educational Physiologists, Social Workers/Sure Start, Police
- Security organisations
- Professional advisors and consultants
- Charities and voluntary organisations
- Police forces, courts, tribunals
- Professional bodies
- School Clubs
- NHS Track and Trace

Department for Education

The Department for Education (DFE) collects personal data from educational settings and local authorities via various statutory data collections. We are required to share information about our pupils with the Department for Education (DFE) either directly or via our local authority for the purpose of those data collections, under:

Section 537A of the Education Act 1996 and Regulation 6 (d) of the Education (Individual Pupil Information) (Prescribed Persons) (England) Regulations 2009,

Section 47 of the Statistics and Registration Service Act 2007 and the Statistics and Registration Service Act 2007 (Disclosure of Pupil Information) (England) Regulations 2009,

Section 3 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013

We share children in need and children looked after data with the Department on a statutory basis, under Section 83 of 1989 Children’s Act, Section 7 of the Young People’s Act 2008 and also under section 3 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

All data is transferred securely and held by DfE under a combination of software and hardware controls which meet the current government security policy framework.

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Local Authorities

We may be required to share information about our pupils with the local authority to ensure that they can conduct their statutory duties under

- The Schools Admission Code, including conducting Fair Access Panels

Requesting access to your personal data

Under data protection legislation, parents and pupils have the right to request access to information about them that we hold. To make a request for your personal information, or be given access to your child's educational record, contact the School's Data Protection Officer at dpo@boothferryprimary.co.uk.

Depending on the lawful basis above, you may also have the right to:

- object to processing of personal data that is likely to cause, or is causing, damage or distress
- prevent processing for the purpose of direct marketing
- object to decisions being taken by automated means
- in certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data rectified, blocked, erased or destroyed; and
- a right to seek redress, either through the ICO, or through the courts

How Government uses your data

The pupil data that we lawfully share with the DFE through data collections:

- Underpins school funding, which is calculated based upon the numbers of children and their characteristics in each school
- Informs ‘short term’ education policy monitoring and school accountability and intervention (for example, school GCSE results or Pupil Progress measures)
- Supports ‘longer term’ research and monitoring of educational policy (for example how certain subject choices go on to affect education of earnings beyond school)

Data collection Requirements

The National Pupil Database (NPD)

Much of the data about pupils in England goes on to be held in the National Pupil Database (NPD). The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education and contains information about pupils in schools in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the department.

It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies.

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Sharing by the Department

The law allows the Department to share pupils' personal data with certain third parties, including:

- Schools
- Local authorities
- Researchers
- Organisations connected with promoting the education or wellbeing of children in England
- Other government department and agencies
- Organisations fighting or identifying crime

Organisations fighting or identifying crime may use their legal powers to contact DFE to request access to individual level information relevant to detecting crime. Whilst numbers fluctuate slightly over time, DFE typically supplies data on around 600 pupils per year to the Home Office and roughly 1 per year to the Police.

How to find out what personal information DFE hold about you

Under the terms of the Data Protection Act 2018, you are entitled to ask the Department:

- If they are processing your personal data
- For a description of the data they hold about you
- The reasons they're holding it and any recipient it may be disclosed to
- For a copy of your personal data and details of its source
